Cora Bresciano



Cora is the co-founder and co-executive director of Blue Planet Global Education. Recently, she also spent two years as a Visiting Instructor in Florida Atlantic University's English Department, teaching myth and magical realism in fiction along with creative writing and first-year writing. She speaks on her work in the US and abroad, most recently in Lisbon, Portugal at the Modern Language Association International Symposium. Cora is currently completing her PhD in Comparative Studies at FAU, where her research focuses on the agency of myth and absence in the politics and literature of Spain's 20th and 21st centuries. She holds an MFA in Creative Writing from FAU, where she received the Frank and Courtney Brogan Award in Fiction, and a BS in Music

Education from Hofstra University in New York. She is a citizen of both the US and the EU, making her home in South Florida with a breathtaking view of the sunset and a thousand books.

Dr. Candace Cunningham



Candace is an Assistant Professor in the History Department of Florida Atlantic University. Previously, she was a visiting assistant professor at Stetson University, where she taught public history courses and worked with local organizations to create digital humanities projects using undergraduate research. Before that, she taught in the University of South Carolina's (USC) Opportunity Scholars Program. USC is also where she earned her M.A. and Ph.D., won the Robert H. Wienefeld Essay Prize, and was a Fellow in the Grace Jordan McFadden Professors Program. She is passionate about community collaborations and has worked on several public history projects including Columbia SC 63, the USC Center for Civil Rights History and Research, and Historic Columbia.

Her research is on the 20th century African American experience with a special emphasis on civil rights, education, gender, and the South. She has presented her research at numerous conferences, including the Association for the Study of African American Life and History, the History of Education Society, and Southern Labor Studies. She is currently working on a manuscript about African American teachers who were in the long civil rights movement.

Maxwell Mittman



Maxwell was born in Ventura, California and grew up in North Jersey. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts from Montclair University in 2014. In 2018, Maxwell received his Master of Fine Arts in ceramics from New York State College of Ceramics at Alfred University. Maxwell works in ceramics, painting, and small works on paper. Ashley is a teacher of Digital Animation and International Baccalaureate (IB) Visual Art at GStar School of the Arts for Film, Animation, and Performing Arts in Palm Beach County. A graduate of Ringling College of Art and Design, she has also worked as a 3D animator in the fields of feature film, public television, and advertising. In addition, in past semesters Ashley has lent her talents as a teaching artist to Blue Planet, connecting Florida students with their peers around the world in

Susan has created and directed dramatic writing and performance programs for at-promise students in teen mother and runaway shelters and for students with severe disabilities. She created and directed CHILDREN OF CONFLICT, an international collaboration among young theatre students in Kosovo, South Africa, and Rwanda. In addition to her work at Blue Planet, she teaches writing

to incarcerated students through Exchange for Change and she serves on the Education Committee for the Kravis Center for the Performing Arts. As a program evaluator, she has consulted with the Palm Beach County Cultural Council, Arts4Learning/Miami, The Kravis Center for the Performing Arts, The Center for Creative Education, Theatre Lab at Florida Atlantic University, and the School District of Palm Beach County.
